
Cleaning Up Word HTML in Adobe Dreamweaver




Why does Word HTML Need Cleaning?

The following 25 words in Microsoft Word ...




... become the following 758 lines of HTML code after using the diabolical Save As Webpage command.



Delightful Trivia for Mac-Snobs


This only happens in the Windows version of MS Word.




Cleaning Up Word HTML

Word-generated HTML is so bad there's a specific command for fixing it in Dreamweaver! The process is simple.

- 1. Choose Clean Up Word HTML from the Commands menu.
- 2. Click **OK**.
- 3. Click **OK** again.





In my example, Dreamweaver ripped out 732 lines of code!
